Dear Friends,

For four Wednesdays between 20 and 25 of us have gathered with the Brave Heart family for a meal and Evening Prayer. Dakota song, prayer, flute, and burning sweetgrass have helped bring us closer to our Sioux relatives, who (I forgot to mention) funded and built half of our Cathedral in Faribault before they left this state. We have worked through an Episcopal curriculum aimed at becoming conscious of the role of the church in displacing the Native people of this country. It became clear that, 150 years after the US - Dakota war, the issue is not very far from our collective memories, and works in the background of almost everything we do. The way we have treated one another forms us. The trauma plays out in the descendants of the 10% of Indians who were left alive, in ways that are well-known. How the trauma persists in the white descendants is less clear. That it all begins with a Papal Bull declaring any non-Christian and their property to be fair game for seizure, dispossession and enslavement, and continues with ideas of manifest destiny is obvious. What dumbfounds me is that those Indians believed we were all related, while the Christians struggled to treat them as our neighbors. We have work to do to repair the breach. Thanks be to God that we have some opportunity to do it.

Separately, speaking last week to a parent about a child's intuition of God, we were amazed by the little girl's understanding that everything is related through God. Essentially she told us what Presiding Bishop Michael Curry said at Niobara last month; since we all come from one God, that means "I am your brother." One of the great tasks of parenthood is to nurture what the child knows instinctively, and to help it grow. How do we as a community help parents in this critical task? So that the child grows in the knowledge and love of God? These are old questions, but they require very immediate answers, for before we know it the child has grown beyond what they knew instinctively and it is lost. And the parents are left wondering what they might have done differently. Later this summer we'll spend a couple of evenings on the subject, with some ice cream, because that is bound to help the process.

Until then, let us remember what we say every Sunday, with Christians across time and continents for 2 millennia: "We believe in one God..." Therefore, I am your brother, and these are my children.
