Dear Friends. Good news of great joy. For God so loved the world...

On the day of Shimon Peres' funeral I walked to the top of the Mount of Olives, hoping that I might get better perspective from higher ground. It was an act of penance of sorts — a steep climb in the hot noon of the day. I expected to punish my feet. I ended up punishing my bald head and nose with sunburn that kept me company for weeks. What I didn't expect was that you can see Bethlehem from there. A Palestinian pointed it out — there towards the south, where the smoke rose. There was often smoke rising from that direction, he said. Through binoculars you can see the wall that separates Bethlehem from Jerusalem, and the checkpoint that has been the site of much protest and violence.

If you had been in Bethlehem at Christmas you would have found it to be the center of Christian attention, and if you go online and search for images of Bethlehem/Christmas/Israel (Palestine doesn't work quite as well) you will find lots to look at. Processions, and people in vestments, and candles and tear gas and smoke. If you keep your focus you will notice that there are re-enactors too, and that they are adults. No children's Christmas Pageant here. Joseph, Mary, the shepherds, the Magi on their camels with attendants are all adults, and, I guess, all Palestinians.

Here is the thing that astonishes me: the real center of Christianity in the Holy Land appears to be in Bethlehem. And it is Palestinian and Arab, not western, or Greek or anything that you or I might be more familiar with. Moreover, as they retell the story of very pregnant, very Jewish Mary (and Joseph) journeying over 70 difficult miles to comply with Roman oppression, they themselves are the subject of similar circumstances. Can you see the mental gymnastics it must require for an Arab these days to identify with a poor Jewish family and find that in them God's Light has come into the world?

What is it that they hear God saying that leads them to think that this is their story and brings hope, the absence of fear?

As we head into 2017, my prayer for myself, and for all of us, is that we might embrace some of that same conviction, and walk the walk Jesus walked, amongst the oppressed, in poverty, with fire in our hearts. Even if we choose to make only the smallest piece of that story ours, it will be something, a story for adults not prepared to accept the world as it is, but who love it with some of the fierceness that God does.

Our second Visible Gifts eBay auction offered more than 50 items that were donated to St. Paul's by more than a dozen parishioners; it grossed \$3,030 in sales and donations.

The Anatolian prayer rug sold for \$1,125 to a rug collector in New York; the 14th century folio printed on one of the first printing presses sold for \$600 and will be donated to the manuscript museum at St. John's University; and the antique clock went to a California designer for \$360; but the real fun was with the rare Red Wing pottery 20-lb butter crock, which went to eBay's largest pottery seller from Ohio for \$530. Several dozen other items made interesting Christmas gifts for people throughout the United States!

The funds from PayPal will be credited to St. Paul's in January 2017, after the final eBay invoice is processed. After shipping costs (paid by buyer) and PayPal commission (\$68), St. Paul's nets \$2,886 for the Christmas auction. Together with the April auction of Teddy Bears and Costas' Candies, Visible Gifts made \$3,186 from 2016 sales, and will donate \$315 to Transitional Housing of Steele County, in keeping with our mission to make God's love visible in our dealings with each other and the world.

We are positioned now for future eBay auctions, so please be thinking of fun items to donate. A Valentine's Day fundraiser is one possibility, if enough gifts surface.
