Dear Friends:

I hope you had the opportunity to watch Michael Curry's sermon at the Royal Wedding. There might not have been much said that struck you as particularly unusual – after all you hear that sort of gospel preaching from time to time. But believe me when I tell you that there has never been anything like that at a state event in Britain. And so people were aghast and astounded all over the world. Don't know about you, but I just found myself smiling. A little bit knowingly. Because there was much more that lay behind that sermon

Now you will remember that the US Episcopal branch of the Anglican Communion has been under fire, and under sanction, from much of the rest of the Anglican world for its inclusive approach to ... just about everything.

Not many people noticed, but it is worth observing that this preacher was chosen by the happy couple, and they had a good idea what was coming. Their choice alone is remarkable. But even more remarkable than that, the preacher must have been approved by both the Archbishop of Canterbury, and by the Queen too.

As a result the US Episcopal Church found itself rehabilitated in a remarkable way, in front of countless millions on TV, in a moment of nostalgia and optimism. And it was in that moment that Michael Curry chose to preach the love and grace at the heart of God's power, and the gospel.

Some people have asked what it is this Episcopal church has to offer in this present day. It used to be obvious – we brought the King James Version of the Bible to the world, and the Book of Common Prayer, and some great theologians whom you may or may not know, but they include C.S. Lewis.

What we bring today is summed up in the bravery of Michael Curry. It is no small thing to be the descendent of slaves and to stand in front of the Queen and the world in Windsor Chapel and to challenge the world. Later on, capitalizing on the notoriety of the moment, he made this more pointed observation, he said, "If it doesn't look like love, if it doesn't look like Jesus of Nazareth, it cannot be claimed to be Christian." It's a simple measurement, but every now and again some brave Christian needs to stand up in front of the world and say it loudly.
