Dear Friends:

Time to put the cat among the pigeons on another sad, sad day.

It is not the guns. It is not the mental health.

It is something much more fundamental, and here it is, simple and appalling:

This country, more than the vast majority of other societies, believes that it is acceptable to kill other people.

Oh no! Only under certain exceptional circumstances, you say. But the exceptions we make here are far beyond what would acceptable elsewhere. That is made plain in the terrible statistics. Or the daily, daily, daily news. The exceptions have become the numbing, permissive norm. And this norm is not unconnected to all sorts of other permissions we have granted ourselves, all sorts of "exceptionalism."

My question is, how can we be so arrogant as to excuse ourselves? God is judge, and God is clear. Everyone that we contemplate killing is made in the image of God. No exceptions. It is not simply that we skirt around the commandment to love our neighbor – it is worse than that. We say we love God, or honor God, but we make normal the killing of what God loves. Both things cannot be true at the same time. The facts say clearly that our profession of faith is just lip service, and a lie.

How can we deal with this pervasive idolatry? We cannot be a murderous society and a righteous, merciful, just, compassionate, Godly one at the same time. The tension is unbearable and will break us.

The only answer I can offer is that we seek God and the truth more closely, and grace.

No one feels this tension more acutely than our young people.

At this time of year it is my privilege to read lots of letters and notes from teens about to step into the world on their own. Here are a couple of excerpts from this spring:

One young person writes of St. Paul's and Teens Encounter Christ. "[The people] you encounter are so amazing they won't judge... I want to say thank you ... it has changed my life."

And from another teenager who has struggled for her place in the world: "Thank you for everything... for making me feel welcome, a part of God's community. Without the emphasis on us all being made in God's image, I am certain I would not be here, or really, even alive."

So often in reading these letters the wisdom that emerges is that the greatest, most damaging sin we can commit against another person is to diminish them.

Conversely, the greatest gift we can give another is to value them (because God values them) as we promised at baptism, "to seek and to serve Christ in all persons."

It is time to do it loudly, publicly, without exception or excuse, and stop playing gracious host to a murderous, idolatrous, and ungodly norm.

Discussion on Lenten Lunches

- 1. J. Ostlund reported that the Net Profit from Lenten Lunches (2018) was \$1,265.10.
- 2. This year's earnings are comparable to the last few years.
- 3. The numbers for attendees were low the first 3 lunches. Many of lunches later averaged 50-60 attendees. This led into the discussion that our advertising was late this year and that may have been one reason. It was also mentioned competition with other churches on Ash Wednesday could be a factor.
- 4. The group discussed the many forms of advertising available to us free or with minimum charge. Ads in the Owatonna People's Press are quite expensive compared to our earnings. Suggestions were made to use social media more at the next years luncheon.
- 5. A motion was made by D. Spitzack and seconded by J. Dixon that we pay for half of the advertising for Lenten Lunches, \$281.00. The church will pay the remaining portion. Total advertising was \$562.00.
- 6. K. Warehime suggested we have an Advertising Committee to market and promote our Women of St. Paul's events. This is to include Lenten Lunches, Christmas bazaar, Summer Garage Sale etc. There was a motion made by G. Zinsli and seconded by M. Dixon.
- J. Skluzacek, graciously agreed to chair this committee.
- 7. The proceeds from our 2018 Lenten lunches will go to Rachel's Light. This organization is still in the evolving stage but their goal will be to provide services and temporary shelter for women. This organization was selected by the Women of St. Paul's during our January 28, 2018 meeting and agreed the total proceeds would go to Rachel's Light.

8. The check was written/given for the amount of \$1265.10 to K. Warehime. She will give it to one of the leaders of this project. Hopefully we can get a photo of this exchange and have it in the OPP

Discussion on our Summer Garage Sale:

- 1. D. Spitzack will again chair this event and will take place on the last weekend in July.
- 2. J. Conlin reminded ladies that we do not want any clothes or heavy equipment such as treadmills, as it is difficult sell and handle/lift these items.
- 3. There will be follow-up information from the chairperson about the bazaar.

Discussion on Reduce, Reuse and Recycle and How are we doing at St. Paul's.

- 1. We do have a recycle program at our church, but there is a need for improvement.
- 2. J. Peterson suggested we stop using all plastic utensils, cups, polystyrene (Styrofoam) cups and plastic tablecloths. We will continue to supply napkins and plates without a coating on them.
- 3. Strongly encourage these products not be brought to our church anymore.
- 4. Looking into small glassware plates to use at coffee hour.
- 5. We will continue to use up the paper plates we have already purchased.
- 6. Motion made to form a "St Paul's Green Team" made by J. Boisen and seconded by K. Brittain.
- 7. Members on the team include: G. Plathe, D. Spitzack, K. Warehime, L. Alt and J. Peterson.
- 8. This will be presented to the vestry for approval and a written statement supported our recommendations.
