Dear Friends.

What a wonderful Christmas it was at St. Paul's: worship was truly lovely and so was the service; by which I mean your service to others throughout the season, not just the 50 individuals and families fed with Christmas baskets, but in the ways in which several of you stepped forward to help others, sometimes in ways that felt quite risky. Thank you for taking the gospel seriously.

The Annual Meeting is next week. With some formality we will adopt a budget and elect a governing body. It makes me wonder if this is what Jesus expected the Gospel to look like 2,000 years on. And yet it seems inescapable. There has to be some structure to support ministry. Not to simply maintain the building (though that is part of it). Not to ensure faithfulness in our teaching and worship (though that is part of it too). But the first priority for this structure is to sustain and nurture a community that grows closer to God and serves God's world. Those things can get lost.

As I write it is almost exactly 25 years since the Rev. Steve Judd was ordained deacon. In the Episcopal Church the deacon's role is often described as the bridge between church and the world. There are other obligations too, to do with serving at the altar and teaching. For several years Steve was responsible for all the deacons of the Diocese, their ministries and formation. But the most important role of all is as an example in ministry, especially with the poor and disadvantaged. Those of you who know him will have seen how he goes about this ministry simply and consistently. I have from the beginning admired the quiet humility of Steve's service — by day the Federated VP, his alter ego something completely different. I know Steve has struggled with the dichotomy, and I hope he won't mind me describing it in these terms, but I want you to be conscious too of the necessary courage, commitment and humility without which the gospel will not be heard.

Steve is absent this Sunday, so won't be too embarrassed by this. Our Second Sunday collection is in his honor and I hope you will be generous. He has asked that the funds raised go to Rachel's Light, the next iteration in Owatonna of faithful people providing shelter for homeless families. If you remember your gospel, especially this year's gospel of Luke, you shouldn't be too surprised that the poor, the disadvantaged, the children and their struggling parents are the Deacon's first choice.

# Recycle Batteries and Inh Cartridges

We will start collecting and recycling all small batteries for your convenience at St. Paul's. This includes non-rechargable batteries, such as size A, AA, AAA, C, D or 9-volt disposable alkaline batteries and rechargeable batteries, such as those containing lead, mercury, nickel or cadmium.

We are aware that non-rechargable batteries can be thrown in your trash, but we will also collect these for you. We will have a small container in the lower level by the coat rack (outside the daycare room) for you to dispose of spent batteries. Our plan is to recycle the batteries at Batteries Plus which is one of a couple places committed to recycling old batteries properly, for a minimum charge.

Our second recycling opportunity is to recycle your used ink cartridges. Crisis Resource Center of Steele County will recycle the cartridges. This is one of their fund raisers. Last year they collected enough cartridges to earn about \$1000.00. They will accept any type of cartridges and have active programs with other churches and businesses in Owatonna.

FYI- light bulbs can be recycled at Lowe's as well as the compact fluorescent but not the long tube fluorescent bulbs. These fluorescent bulbs contain mercury and need to be recycled safely. Ace Hardware will recycle your fluorescent bulbs for \$1.00 apiece. Some other places that accept fluorescent bulbs are: Owatonna Public Utilities, Retrofit Company and Batteries Plus. There may be a small charge for the fluorescent bulbs.

\*There are other stores in Owatonna that also want to help us Go Green. We will have more information in the future. When you are at your local stores, you might notice what they are doing to Go Green. Let us know so we can share it with St. Paul's!


