

Dear Friends,

This Lent we have been speaking about faith and hope and love at our Lenten Lunches. The problem is that our human experience is one of continual brokenness. That experience persists as life goes on. If there is one thing that we all know, it is that we are mortal.

But I wonder if you also have an experience of growing holier? Maybe the foot is still bothering you, but is your heart getting bigger, your soul gentler?

Easter is fast approaching. For so much of our lives we live outside on the edge of the mystery, but here in these coming few days, we are invited inside a handful of "thin places" to live as part of the paradigm that claims to shed light on "life, the universe, and everything." You will be part of the meal (my favorite meal) on Maundy Thursday; your feet will be washed (if you like) and you can wash others; you can attend at the foot of the cross; you can shout the very first Alleluia! Be as present as you can through these last days of Lent, and Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Because these days are not simply about Jesus, they are about you.

Let me offer you this prayer again. There may be no such thing as an original prayer, and this one has many sources, but in this form it is unique to us and sums up what we have learned to proclaim at St. Paul's. And may God give you a blessed Easter.

Most Merciful God:

You called us forth from the dust of the earth, and claimed us for Christ in the waters of baptism.Look upon us as we enter these Forty Days bearing the mark of ashes, and bless our journey through the desert of Lent, that when at length we shall come to Easter, we may know the joy of resurrection and the fullness of your grace. As we prepare to shout that Christ is risen, bring us to know that so, with Christ, are we. Amen.

Can You Give Up Paper Towels for Lent?

Even though we're well into the season, we can all still give up something for Lent: paper towels. Give them up for the weeks remaining in Lent...or a week....or a day.

The following article was shared on National Public Radio on March 10, 2019, by Kristen Hartke, a food writer based in Washington, D.C.

Keep it clean and eco-friendly at the same time. I'm a clean freak and used to go through an unseemly amount of paper towels on a daily basis, but it's easy enough to take old T-shirts or towels and cut them up to use to wipe down surfaces. (If you're cleaning surfaces that have been in contact with raw meat, poultry or fish, throw those towels in the washing machine to get them really clean.) I'm also a

fan of bamboo paper towels, which have the look and feel of traditional paper towels, yet are made from a highly renewable source and also break down in landfills in just 45 days. Better yet, they can be reused up to 100 times. I can attest to how sturdy they are because I bought a single roll of bamboo paper towels for \$7 a full year ago and still have more than half the roll left, using a single bamboo towel to clean my countertops and stove for a few weeks until it's worn out (rinse the sheet in hot water, then wring and let air dry). When I consider that I probably spent up to \$15 a month on single-use paper towels before, that roll of bamboo paper towels was a huge bargain. As for kitchen sponges, keep an eye out for those made with natural materials. because typical polyurethane sponges cannot be recycled and end up in landfills.

Memorial Garden


