Dear Friends,

Advent is here, almost. It would be traditional at this point to complain about premature Christmas music and the trees and lights in stores, but I find I am not so bothered by them. It's almost as though people just can't wait for something they know is good and exciting.

Expectation is a Christian characteristic too. There were monks in second century Ireland who built their lives around it; you can still see their beehive shaped monastic cells, perched above the sea on Skellig Michael, facing the East where the Sun of Righteousness will rise, as Malachi says. (Should the picture look familiar, it's probably because you saw the last Star Wars movie.)



If you are like me, you are looking forward on tiptoe to see loved ones again this season. Children find expectation simple, but for adults it is framed with the understanding of passing time and the need to treasure each opportunity for reunion and love. These things only come with expectation and that is why it is holy.

The opposite of expectation and the expectant waiting of Advent, is resignation. With resignation comes a narrowing of perspective, the shrinking of hope and possibility, the decline of optimism and faith. Most importantly, your vision gets poorer and so too the chance that you will notice God.

So this is your task for Advent: to be as excited to encounter God at work in the world as God, I think, is to encounter you.

I hope you will get this letter in time for Thanksgiving. Thank God we don't have to think about presents yet, but can just be excited about seeing each other, and eating. It's remarkable how good life's simple gifts are. Remarkable but not unusual; I believe God made the world like this, for this, with these joys, these expectations, built in.

St. Paul's Epiphany Cake

Epiphany marks the arrival of the three wise men delivering gifts to baby Jesus in Bethlehem. Many cultures celebrate by eating cake or bread with trinkets hidden within to represent the wise men's gifts.

The January - February LEAVEN from 1980 mentions that St. Paul's. "celebrated epiphany with a breakfast put on by the men, a short program by Father Doug Hiza, and much singing and fellowship." After that a service followed with the baptism of David Maki. Following the service, it states that the epiphany cake was, "an old custom revived. Hidden in the cake were a ring and three silver dollars." Betty Kristo found the ring in her slice and was responsible for the next year's cake. Russel Gary, Dorothy Manthey, and Linda Sothman found the silver dollars. Traditionally, these silver dollars were to be invested in God's work in the coming year.

The ring that St. Paul's hides in the cake has a date engraved from the 1870's. If anyone has any more information on the origins of the ring, please speak to history committee member.
