
How did he get there, from Jewish/Roman teenager to the most renowned and loved

missionary of the 1st Century? I say most renowned and loved because


why else would early Christians have gone to such extreme measures to preserve in the New Testament every single piece of writing that could be connected to Paul? Why else would our forebears have named us after him?

8:00 p.m.


