

Dear Friends,

There were a dozen people around the table, we were talking about sightings of God and those people who needed our help and prayers, which is what we always do; it provides the real context for our adventure. And then we realized that sitting together we had two or three of the best social workers I have ever met, a doctor of psychology, people whose whole lives have been about teaching, and managing support for the needy — the collection of gifts and wisdom was extensive.

I know that every one of us comes to Church hoping to encounter God. And of course that is why we center ourselves together in worship. But this is not a solitary enterprise. We are given to each other in order to help our friends and neighbors grow on the way. Instead of the word neighbor, try the word companion, and God is our companion too.

One of the most reliable ways to encounter God is to serve. Especially when we do it together. And although we might be inclined to think this is for the benefit of others, it is actually indispensable to us. For without it, we are not a church. Church is service in and by community (to the glory of God) which is why so many people are not sure which is more important — Sunday worship, or coffee hour.

Focusing the conversation on community versus a fundraiser, more ideas were tossed around. What about a return to a brunch or lunch? We know we'll fail miserably trying to replicate Betty's quiche, but maybe soups or cinnamon rolls... something that invites people to sit around tables together. And what if we have a couple cookie baking parties in the church kitchen and/or invite kids and their friends to make cookies or crafts on a Wednesday night? And what if...?

If that conversation sparked some of your own ideas, please share them. And go for it. At the very least, we'll end up with funny stories and time well spent in community.

Our Finances and the Importance of your Contributions

We are approaching 18 months of being rich. Since part two of the gift arrived in late summer, St. Paul's has an endowment now of almost \$2 million. The donor stipulated that the principal be preserved, and the interest earned be used for the general support of the Parish. These annual earnings of about \$100,000 cover a bit more than half of our operating expenses. The remaining \$85,000 is provided by your contributions and fundraising. This year we are about \$12,000 short of that hope; on the other hand, unusually high Stock Market gains, and some low costs have compensated. (Painting the Church cost about 50% of what we anticipated.) Thank you for your faithfulness — as we work together to serve (to the glory of God) we hope you can see that your gifts and commitment are indispensable.
